#### **Wildflower Show**

The annual wildflower show, organised by the Friends of Brisbane Ranges and supported by the Anakie Tree Group and Parks Victoria, was held on the 8<sup>th</sup> October in the Anakie Staughtonvale hall. This show proved to be the most successful yet with over 400 people visiting the display and 120 people taking part in the wildflower tours.

All plant species were collected from private property with kind permission of the owners. It is an offence to collect protected plants off Crown land without a DSE plant collection permit.

The collection consisted of plants indigenous to the Brisbane Ranges. People attending the display and/or walk were able to discover and learn about the delicate, colourful and diverse display of plants that grow within this area. It was by no means a complete display but a small snapshot of what can been seen, at this time of year, when visiting the Brisbane Ranges National Park, Steiglitz Historic Park and adjoining private property bushland.

The plant show was complemented by additional displays from a number of other associated organizations. These were; DSE Land for Wildlife, Trust for Nature, DPI Pest Plant and Pest Animal and Parks Victoria, all of which were able to provide assistance to the interested public either by discussion and/or by issuing free handouts.

The show was extensively advertised within the local print media and radio. This advertising, the use of the hall as a venue and the magnificent post fire floral display in the wildfire affected areas, encouraged peoples curiosity enough for them to take the journey to see the show.

The Friends group are already planning for their next show in 2007 and to build on this year's success.

## Wildflower Show

Well. What a wildflower show! No doubt inspired by the extravagant display of wildflowers put on in the park, Helena and co-organisers put together a magnificent display in the Anakie-Staughton Vale hall. Fourteen FoBR and three Anakie Tree Planting Group volunteers helped collect the wildflowers and set up the hall. Boxy also rounded up a collection of stuffed animals from the Parks offices (no. not the staff!) and put together a very impressive fauna display on the main stage. Other groups also had tables set up in the hall with information on pest plants and animals, tree planting and Land for Wildlife. The FoBR table sold honey, books, wildflower CDs and indigenous plants. Overall, approximately \$1500 profit was made which will be put back into the kitty for running the show next year.

Due to curiosity about the park after the fire or improved publicity, this year we had approximately 200 visitors to the wildflower show. Two bus tours were run with approximately 115 people going on the tours. People came from all over the place, with visitors being recorded from Anakie, Bacchus Marsh, Ballarat, Balliang, Brighton, Collingwood, Corio, Drysdale, Geelong, Hoppers Crossing, Inverleigh, Lara, Little River, Melton, Mentone, Meredith, Mt. Waverley, Nunawading, Ocean Grove, Queensland, She Oaks, Steiglitz, Torquay, United Kingdom and Werribee. They were treated to a stunning display of wildflowers, including a grand army of flowering grass trees. We're still waiting for Chris Worrall to finish counting the flowers and provide a report on whether his initial estimate earlier in the year was accurate.

Speaking of Chris, he performed an important duty on the day by officially opening the remainder of the park to the public (several of whom wandered down the track from behind the ceremonial ribbon during his speech!). The "Park Closed" sign has gone from the road down to Stony Creek, and may it never return!
