On a very cold morning, a dozen brave and well rugged up Friends met at Furze Track. We were given fluorescent vests to wear, so that anybody driving by would see us walking along the firebreak, and set off in search of sallow wattles and other weeds to pull out, dig up and cut down. We found a few of the wattles, and learnt to tell them apart from young furze hakeas and blackwoods, then ran out of weeds!! As we wandered along, we picked up rubbish, and found flowers and fungi to examine. We found four species of greenhoods -tall, dwarf, nodding and banded. The banded greenhoods (which have brown hoods) were of particular interest, as none of us had seen them before. As well as the usual red and green correa flowers, we found some with cream and green flowers. We found a few types of fungi growing on dead wood, including some bright orange bracket fungi. There were also some large puffballs popping up with the descriptive name of horse dung fungi, tiny white oval shaped fungi with black spots growing on kangaroo poo (small dung buttons), and a few species of 'little brown fungi'. We found a few more sallow wattles, just as it was time to head back to the cars.

After lunch at Anakie Gorge, Judy led us on scenic tour of the Brisbane Ranges, to meet our head ranger and geological expert, Mark Urquart, at Fairley's Track. In cold wind and some rain, we walked past signs of old quarrying activity to a large slot cut out of the rocks beside the track. Lumpy rock on one side of the slot was the top coarse sediments, from a long ago underwater avalanche (which are called turbinates). The neighbouring rock, which had been quarried, was made up of the fine sediments from the bottom of the next avalanche. These fine sediments became shale and slate. At some time, all these avalanche rocks had been tipped on their sides. Mark also showed us that mudstone really is made of mud. It was interesting to be able to see the geology and have it explained. We all agreed it was time to find warmer places, and went home.

Geology Report by Owen Cook (aged eight)

Turbinates are underwater avalanches that are formed by sediments sliding off the continental shelf. The sandstone side was on the right side of the quarry and the left was slate, shale and mudstone. The You Yangs were formed by hardened lava moving upwards. The rock in the You Yangs is granite. It formed at the same time as Mt Buffalo, but it cooled more slowly, so it has more quartz in it.
