Birds with Ruth and Paul

On Saturday night I asked myself - Why did we say we would go?... that rain doesn't look like ever stopping. Ducks may love the water but a full day searching in the rain for birds in the bush just didn't sound like a good way to spend a Sunday.

However the day started cloudy but warm, still and not raining! Fantastic. We all keenly headed off to the northern part of our Brissie Ranges National Park to meet with our bird enthusiasts Ruth Woodrow and Paul Dodd who seem to be able to recognise every single sound in the bush. It was no surprise to hear that they have recorded nearly every bird in Victoria during 2010.

Everything was fresh and wet in an area which is still black from a recent control burn. The blackened grass trees looked magnificent with their flower spikes. The kids were distracted by critters enjoying themselves after the rain - bullants, beetles, ants, frogs and spiders while other Friends just couldn't resist looking at plants.

After a relaxed lunch we strolled along the nearby area where there were more birds among the shrubs and low vegetation planted by the Friends.





Some were enjoying the plants. Other attractions included a Tiger Snake near the waterhole, lots of ants Common Froglet *Crinia Signifera* and more.

Cathy's Column

I don't know about you but when a member of the public says something unkind about 'our Ranges', I get defensive. One day last spring, I was on an excursion with other flora enthusiasts and when we came to find a *Grevillea rosmarinifolia*, one of the members of our group said "That's only a hybrid". My hackles raised and I was going to rebuke him but then thought maybe I should find out more.

I attended the FJC Rogers Seminar (hosted by the Australian Plants Society Bairnsdale group) and the topic was Grevilleas & Hybrids. By the time the two days were finished, I was grevilleaed out.

Regardless, the one thing I did find out is that there is an immense amount of study being done with the *Grevillea rosmarinifolia* group and it appears that **the Brisbane Ranges form is unique.**

So much so that there is a good chance that it will be declared a species in its own right. For now, it is known as *Grevillea rosmarinifolia ssp glabella*.



The other interesting plants are much smaller but no less difficult to find. One such is the *Lobelia pratioides* (Poison Lobelia) The flower is all of 8mm across.



The fun part of walking in the Ranges is finding different flora when least expecting it. One of the large swamps in the area has produced some fine plants and we were recently looking for a specific sun orchid.



Not finding it was a disappointment but finding an unexpected one was exhilarating.

The sun orchid is *Thelymitra peniculata* (Trim Sun Orchid). One of the distinguishing factors is the column arms which are curved upwards.



The fire-break area parallel to Ballan Road continues to produce some beautiful flowering plants and we were able to enjoy the *Prasophyllum odoratum* (Scented Leek Orchid) amongst all the *Argentipallium obtusifoliuim* (Blunt Everlasting).



So much activity around the festive season can sometimes create stress and so I suggest – take a walk and enjoy our park. Happy Holidays!
